

Bob and Lee Woodruff Visit Deaconess' Concord Campus

Deaconess Abundant Life Communities was honored to host Bob and Lee Woodruff at our Concord Campus on Wednesday April 10th for a discussion and signing of their recently released book, **In An Instant, A Family's Journey of Love and Healing**. The book, co-authored by the Woodruffs, follows their courageous journey that began on January 28, 2006, when Bob, an ABC news anchor, was gravely wounded by a bomb blast while reporting in Iraq.

With opening remarks expressing their deep gratitude for the support of their family and friends that helped them through the worst crisis of their life, the Woodruff's shared their inspirational story of a painstakingly slow recovery, through intensive speech and cognitive therapy, reading, writing, and forcing Bob's brain to accomplish simple tasks he had previously taken for granted to a standing room only crowd in the Newbury Court Theatre. Members of the Deaconess' Concord Community had been following the Woodruff's journey closely over the past year offering support to Lee's parents, David and Terry McConaughy, who are residents of Newbury Court.



An appreciation of the excellent care and support the Woodruff's received during their ordeal coupled with the awareness that many families in similar circumstances often lack the resources to meet

their medical, emotional and financial needs gave birth to the Bob Woodruff Family Fund for Traumatic Brain Injury. The Fund will raise money to be used to support nonprofit organizations serving members of the military who have sustained a traumatic brain injury. In some circumstances,

Through the "subsidiary" Boards of Directors and "Community Councils" at each location, there will be increased community involvement and a greater sense of local "ownership" in our senior living communities. These "subsidiary" Board of Directors will provide oversight that will offer greater focus and better control. The "parent" board will concentrate on more global issues, while each "subsidiary" board will focus on the quality of service, operations, development and community connections for a specific senior living community. Another important reason for this re-organization is to manage our risk by insulating one part of our operations from another.

Virtual Visit Technology Coming to the Deaconess Concord Community

Here at Deaconess Abundant Life Communities, we know that a decision to move into a senior community may be the “best” move, but it can also mean separation from an older adult’s social network of family and friends that can lead to isolation and loneliness. While moving into a senior community creates the opportunity to form new relationships, these relationships are no substitute for remaining “connected” to family members and life-long friends.

This “connectedness” is also crucial for those serving as caregivers. A survey cosponsored by the National Council on the Aging (NCOA) and The Pew Charitable Trusts shows that more than 7 million Americans have become long-distance caregivers -- those who manage care for a relative aged 55 years and up who lives at least one hour away. According to the Metlife Mature Market Institute, 34 million adult caregivers, more than 15 percent are caring for aging parents or relatives who, on average, live 450 miles or more than seven hours away.

In an effort to provide opportunities for the older adults living at Deaconess' Concord Community to communicate “face-to-face” with family and friends, we are establishing two Family Virtual Visits (FVV) Centers with computer technology that will enable residents, family members and friends to schedule online communication. With the installation of a webcam in the home of family and friends, users will be able to schedule daily visits. Our residents need only arrive at the scheduled visit time to be connected via a large screen TV without any effort, computer knowledge or technical expertise. This new technology will allow visitors to see each other in real time for a virtual “face-to-face” visit.

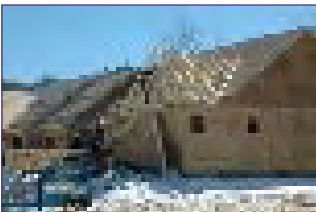
